





THE Temple Bicycle Club is, without doubt, one of the most important associations of wheel-men in the Metropolis. and as a club they have more often than not done good service in the advancement of our sport; therefore it was with feelings akin to regret that we perused the following circular which the Temple has just issued, and which has been forwarded to those Metropolitan clubs who have not as yet seen fit to render to the Bicycle Union the support it should have received at

their hands. The circular in question runs as tollows :-

Tenby House, Cambridge-gardens, W. North Kensington,

May 8th, 1880.

Dear Sir, -At a meeting of the committee of the Temple Bicycle Club, held on the 6th day of April last, the following resolution with reference to the amateur question was passed :-

"The committee think it advisable that a meeting should be called of those Metropolitan clubs which do not recognise the Bicycle Union, for the purpose of discussing the amateur question and taking some unanimous action in the matter, and they empower their hon. sec. to convene such a meeting."

I have, therefore, called a meeting, to be held at the Portugal Hotel, Fleetstreet, on Wednesday, the 26th day of May inst., at 7 p.m., and in conformity with the above resolution I beg to request the attendance of your club as a non-Union Metropolitan Club. Will you kindly forward to me, at your earliest convenience, the names of two members whom your club may select to represent them at the meeting, with full power to vote and act as their delegates ?-Yours faithfully, F. STEVENS, Hon. Sec. Temple B.C.

Note. - If any non-Union Metropolitan B.C. should not have received the above invitation, will they kindly communicate with me ?-F.S.

It was a long and arduous struggle to gather together a representative body who should be ready to take up the cudgels in defence of the interests of wheel-men generally, but the desirable end was attained at last, and all things seemed going as "merrily as a marriage bell," when the bugbear "Amateur Question" appeared and set all the racing world by the ears. It is indeed a thousand pities that now we have a representative body (to reverse an old saying) that the "ha'porth of tar" should spoil the ship. At all events, even if the Temple Bicycle Club do not agree with the definition of an amateur as dictated by the council of the Union, we do not think they are justified in attempting to form an opposition league. Rather should they have manfully stuck to the Union and sent their delegates

who, armed with the fullest possible powers, should represent the feeling of the T.B.C. on the Council, and who, rather than desert the ship, should endeavour to put her in the straight course. Where can Non-union clubs be found to balance the strength exhibited by the name and influence of such clubs as the London, Cambridge Dark Blue, Pickwick, Surrey, and Stanley? Not anywhere. We cannot but feel that the Temple are taking unwise steps, for they should remember that the principal racing clubs of the Metropolis and the two Universities are with the Union, and that they themselves are the only racing club of importance who are among the malcontents. True, the Wanderers and the West Kent are among the discontented ones; but although both are large and influential clubs, neither of them are racing clubs.

In conclusion, we should advise the younger clubs of the Metropolis to consider well ere they are led away--dazzled by the brilliant prospects held out to them by the promoters of an Anti-Union League.

BICYCLE AND CARRIAGE REGULATIONS IN SHEFFIELD.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE "BICYCLING TIMES."

SIR,-May I be allowed to call the at'ention of bicyclists and carriage drivers to the fact that by the by-laws drafted by the Bicycle Union and issued by the Local Government Board for "regulating the use of bicycles" are now in force, by which it is necessary for bleycle riders to carry a lighted lamp between sunset and sunrise, and to give warning of their approach by sounding a bell or whistle when within a reasonable distance from and before passing any horse, carriage, or foot passenger in the roadway, and also keep to the right or offside when overtaking and passing the same. On the other hand drivers should note that by the decision of the Queen's Bench Division in the case of Taylor v. Godwin, a bicycle has been decided to be a carriage within the meaning of section 78 of the Act 5 and 6, William IV., chapter 50, and has therefore equal right to the road with other carriages. and any person not observing the usual rules of the road, or obstructing or otherwise preventing the passage of a b cycle is liable to the same penalty and term of imprisonment as he would be if he did so to any other conveyance. Hoping that these remarks may be of use in explaining the regulations as they at present stand, and may by giving timely warning keep my fellow-riders out of the reach of the law.—I remain, &c., H.
